Living Beyond Ourselves

It has been a decade since Making Kenora Home committed to the vision of a community in which all members have homes that are affordable, adequate and accessible. This goes beyond the provision of housing. It is a vision that will create a community that is inclusive, supportive and caring. It is a vision that requires every community member to live beyond his or her own self-interest. The call to collaboration will enable Kenora to become an exemplar of healthy community living.

It has always been easy to make excuses about the state of our community—"We have a homelessness problem because too many people come into our community with problems of their own"... "It's the government's mandate to deliver social housing"... "People are homeless because of their own behaviour"—These are the excuses that are easily identified as blatant self-interest.

A more insidious excuse making comes disguised as good intentions—"I'm not against having an emergency shelter but not in this location"... "Everyone needs housing but our neighbourhood isn't suitable for those kind of places"... "Yes, the city should do something but they better not raise my taxes"—We have to be vigilant against these murmuring whispers that stack up "but"resses against forward social movement.

There is an old story that teaches us about self-interest and community. A wise old person was asked to explain the difference between heaven and hell. He said that hell was six people chained around a delicious pot of soup. Each person has a spoon with a long handle. Sadly, no one is able to bend their elbows thus each is unable to bring the spoon up to their own mouth. As a result, each is held starving while seated around the soup. Heaven is the same thing except, each person has committed to feeding to someone who can be fed by the same long spoon. By serving each other, they are all fed and satisfied.



This is the year in which we need to act as a community to serve our community. Confront the excuses directly. Reveal the "but"s as imposters. Take responsibility for our future as a caring community.
